ABOUT THE ALLIANCE

Since 1989, the Alliance for Suicide Prevention of Larimer County has provided suicide prevention educational programs and grief support services for youth and adults. We prevent suicide through training and education, providing outreach, and offering support. Annually, our free education programs reach thousands of people across Larimer County and provide invaluable information that could save a life. We offer adult education, youth programming, peer outreach to high risk populations, and grief support to individuals who have lost a loved one to suicide. All our services are free of charge.

The Alliance for Suicide Prevention receives a large portion of funding from Larimer County Behavioral Health Services and the Colorado Office of Suicide Prevention. Because that funding begins in the fall, we have adjusted our annual reports to capture the work accomplished by those specific projects (10/1/21- 9/30/22). We could not be more grateful for those partnerships and are happy to be leaders in the suicide prevention landscape.

SERVICES OFFERED

Youth Education: Our Youth Advisory Council and the program, Resiliency Education Protecting the Lives of Youth, (REPLY) connect with middle and high schoolers to teach them the warning signs of suicide, coping mechanisms, and provide resources.

Adult Education: Through our programs Hope for Today and Question, Persuade, Refer, we provide adult training on reducing the stigma surrounding mental health, recognizing the warning signs of suicide, and how to respond to a person in crisis.

Imagine Zero/CNC: We are proud to be 1 of 6 counties, nationwide implementing a comprehensive, upstream, public health approach to suicide. Made up of a coalition of professionals, agencies, and individuals who meet to improve communication and coordination of services around suicide prevention.

Peer Outreach: We provide support for populations that are statistically at a higher risk for suicidality through individual peer mentorship, work and support groups.

Grief Support: We host two support groups that provide safe spaces for those who are grieving the loss of a loved one to suicide. We also organize the annual Remembrance Walk and Survivors of Suicide Loss Day.

DIRECTOR'S STATEMENT





"It's hard to believe that we are over two years beyond the start of the Covid 19 Pandemic. While those last several years brought many challenges, I am filled with a renewed sense of optimism as we take a look back at our programs and successes over the last 12 months.

During that period, we served 11,214 Larimer County residents, more than doubling the number of people reached compared to 2019 and 2020. With our team reaching more people than ever in our 33 years, we do have a lot to celebrate. We see the impact of our efforts reflected in the nearly 12% reduction in suicides compared to 2019. We didn't accomplish this alone and that significant reduction in suicides is also a testament to the great work that all of our community partners and members contributed to. So, a big thank you to all of our community partners, staff, board, and you for helping to and succeeding at reducing suicide in Larimer County."

GRIEF SUPPORT (152 SURVIVORS SERVED)

- **99** survivors attended 24 Heartbeat support groups

YOUTH PROGRAMMING (5,231 YOUTH TRAINED)

- 5,231 students trained in REPLY across 24 schools
- **620** students referred to mental health professionals
- 94.3% of youth increased their help-seeking behavior
- **700** self-care kits/resources distributed to youth.

IMAGINE ZERO (640 CONNECTED)

- 340 participants at Connect with Intention Around Mental Health Summit
- 300+ youths participated in the Teen Self-Care Fair
